

Unit 13: INDIRECT QUESTIONS AND 'NON-QUESTIONS'

Direct and indirect questions

Where is the waiting room? is a **DIRECT QUESTION**. Do you know where the waiting room is? is an **INDIRECT QUESTION**. It is a polite way of getting information.

a Do not use question formation (Unit 9) after the question word because you have already used it before the word.

Could you tell me how much it costs?	NOT <i>does it cost</i>
Do you know where the toilets are?	NOT <i>are the toilets</i>
Can you ask him when we can leave?	NOT <i>can we leave</i>
Could you tell me what they are doing?	NOT <i>are they doing</i>

b For an indirect question without a question word, use if:

Could you tell me if the pharmacy has a blood pressure clinic tomorrow?
Do you know if the pharmacist will be there?

Reported questions

These questions tell us about questions, but they do not ask them. They are **REPORTED QUESTIONS**.

She wants to know when the course begins.	NOT <i>does . . . begin</i>
He wants to know where he can smoke.	NOT <i>can he smoke</i>

Statements with question words

Here are some more statements with question words:

I can't remember where I have put them.	NOT <i>have I put</i>
I'd like to know what you saw there.	NOT <i>did you see</i>
They haven't decided where they will go.	NOT <i>will they go</i>

Exclamation

An exclamation shows interest or surprise. They use question words but, again, they are not questions.

What a beautiful day it is!

Look how fast they are going!

NOT *is it*

NOT *are they going*
